

Authors' Instructions for the Preparation of Camera-Ready Contributions to Journal of Informatics

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Abstract: The name, the affiliation, and the e-mail address of the author(s) are required. The affiliation is required being specified as shown in this example. DO NOT USE special characters, symbols, or math in title or abstract. The abstract should summarize the contents of the whole information of the paper. The abstract text should be in Browallia New with size 12-point font size. The abstract section to be justified. The abstract text should not shorter than 200 words and should be no longer than 250 words. We would like to encourage you to list your keywords between 3 to 5 keywords and use a comma to separate the keywords.

1. Introduction

The manuscript shall be prepared in Browallia New font using a size 12-point. All section titles in the manuscript is written with bold Browallia New font with size 14-point. Manuscript should be prepared single column.

A manuscript text file containing title, abstract, keywords, contents, acknowledgements, reference list, and appendices (if necessary). All manuscripts must be in English. These guidelines include complete descriptions of the fonts, spacing, and related information for producing your Journal of Informatics (JIT) manuscripts.

2. Materials and Methods

The length of manuscript should not exceed 15 pages to include figures, tables, and references. All references, figure (Fig.) and tables (Table) in the text shall be numbered consequently as they first appear.

2.1 Figures

Place figures at the top or bottom of pages. Avoid placing them in the middle of pages. Figure captions should be below the figures. Insert figures after they are cited in the text. Use the abbreviation “Fig. 1”, even at the beginning of a sentence. Use 11-point Browallia New for Figure labels as shown in Fig. 1.

2.2 Tables

Place tables at the top or bottom of pages. Avoid placing them in the middle of pages. Table heads should be above the tables. Insert figures after they are cited in the text. Use 11-point Browallia New for Table labels.

3. Results and Discussion

The results section presents the raw data, the experimental data, and the results after applying the techniques outlined in the methods section.

Table 1. Font sizes of headings. Table captions should always be positioned *above* the tables.

Title (centered)	Lecture Notes ...	16 point, bold
1 st -level heading	1 Introduction	14 point, bold
2 nd -level heading	1.1 Printing Area	12 point, bold

4. Conclusions

Manuscript must be written using high-quality language. For non-native English language authors, the manuscript should be proof-read by a language specialist. Poor use of English could result in immediate rejection of the paper.

Acknowledgements

Put applicable sponsor acknowledgements here; DO NOT place them on the first page of your manuscript or as a footnote. Acknowledgements should be as brief as possible, in a separate section before the references.

References

Citations of published literature in the text should be given in APA in-text style. APA uses the author's last name and the year of publication. All references mentioned in the Reference list must be cited in the text, and vice versa.

- One author: (Klingman, 1992)
- two authors: (Chen & Li, 2001)
- three or more authors: (Chen et al., 2001)

If the name forms part of a sentence, it should be followed by the year in parenthesis;

- One author: Klingman (1992)
- two authors: Chen and Li (2001)
- three or more authors: Chen et al. (2001)

The References section at the end of the manuscript should list all, only the references cited in the text in alphabetical order of the first author's surname and no number in front of each reference. Titles of the journal or conference proceedings are not abbreviated. The following are examples of reference writing.

Reference to a journal article:

Chen, J. and Li, Y. (2006). Coal fly ash as an amendment to container substrate for *Spathiphyllum* production. *Bioresource Technology*. 97(1), 1920-1926.

Reference to article or abstract in a conference proceeding:

Klingman, L.A. (1992). Induction of floral bud in *Lansium domesticum* by different rates and times of application of chloroethyl phosphonic acid. *Proceedings of the 5th Tropical Fruit Crop Symposium*, Chiang Mai, Thailand, August 10-12, 1992, 231-236.

Reference to a book:

Perry, R.H. and Chilton, C.H. (1973). *Chemical Engineers Handbook*, McGraw-Hill, New York, U.S.A., pp. 112-115.

Reference to an edited book:

Day, P.R. (1965). Particle fractionation and particle size analysis. In *Methods of Soil Analysis*, C.A. Black, editor. Agronomy no. 9, Part 1. American Society of Agronomy, Madison, Wisconsin, U.S.A., pp. 545-567.

Reference to an electronic data source (used only when unavoidable):
